at 78 Main Street.

Near the end of the Mascoma River and adjacent to Main Street, EVA's 2.8-acre site has more than 1,200 feet along the tributary. Stone foundations and other artifacts from an enormous tannery built on the property in 1872 are visible on the nature trail. In addition, EVA is in the process of renovating the historic home erected on the site sometime between 1859 and 1863. The site provides an ideal setting to study the area's early history through surviving documentation and other material evidence. During the first phase of the project, which began last December, students from the high school, under the guidance of Thurber and Dartmouth professor emeritus Jere Daniell, will research historical papers and photographs related to the river, the mills, and other aspects of human development and transformation along the Mascoma. At least two trips to archival collections and libraries in Enfield and Hanover are planned. In addition, students from high school English classes will search for written and visual works inspired by the river and the lake. At the same time, science students

and publicly accessible nature trail on EVA's riverside property will collaborate with environmentalists to study the area's geology, botany, and biology.

> Highlights of the research will be presented early this summer in a site-specific outdoor exhibit at the entrance to EVA's property and nature trail. Soon afterwards, the public will be invited to a free conference. Participants will include Thurber, Daniell, and the local teachers involved with the studies. They will present their findings, propose topics for future research, and recognize the students' contributions to studies of the area's economic, environmental, and cultural history. If funds are available, an illustrated brochure will be produced to summarize the information.

> This spring, after-school art classes will utilize the historical, cultural, and scientific materials to develop artistic compositions highlighting past and current characteristics of the river. These visual responses will be displayed for six months in protected outdoor cases on EVA's riverside property. Once again, a public celebration of the students' contributions will be held on the property, where the historical materials and scientific information will also be exhibited.

Restoration and reconstruction work on the house at 78 Main Street will recommence starting in May. Asbestos and some of the siding were removed last fall. Volunteer workers will continue to dismantle unusable parts of the building and begin restoration to turn the building into two upper apartments and first floor commercial space. To help in this effort, contact the EVA office. Professional and enthusiastic amateur workers are welcome.

Dragon's Gate Tattoo

the navy," says Scott Ibey Jr. "Now, it's just the opposite. It's becoming almost taboo in the military, but practically everyone else is getting them. I've had clients who are nurses, teachers, lawyers, even daycare providers."

Ibey owns and operates Dragon's Gate Tattoo Studio, which opened for business in February on the second floor of the Copeland Block downtown. No stranger to Enfield, Ibey lived in town until he was 13 and still has family here.

He recalls being deeply interested in drawing when he was a child but never considered applying it to a career until he got his first tattoo nine years ago. "I remember it was my birthday when I got that first tattoo because every tattoo seems like a snapshot in time," he says. "They all remind you of something."

To perfect his craft, Ibey apprenticed for a year and a half with Tom Ball of Tatunka Tattoo in Lyme. N.H., then stayed on another three years.
