# **Keep the Good Things Happening!**

What an active year the past one has been for the Enfield Village Association: The downtown bridge work and street improvement was completed, down to the finishing touches of banners and flower plantings. We officially opened the river walk on EVA property at 78 Main Street, providing an outdoor classroom for exploring the area's history, geology, and botany that resulted in a wonderful display of student artwork on the site. The Farmers Market grew in vendor numbers, attendance, and revenue. Our first Shaker Seven Road Race and Fun Run drew many newcomers, as well as residents, for a fresh look at Enfield's superb recreation possibilities

In response to EVA's successes, as well as its energetic outreach, Main Street programs attracted thousands of dollars in grants, in addition to generous in-kind donations and volunteer hours. As a result of the collaborative efforts of the state and town with nonprofit organizations such as EVA, we have seen more and more private initiatives happening as buildings are preserved, improved, and put to new uses.

"This is exactly the way a Main Street program should work, and the way they have worked all over the country," says Gene Talsky, EVA program manager. "When one group shows support of, and a belief in, the viability of downtown as a place to live, work, and visit, others will follow, and there's a snowball effect. We see that in the increase in downtown tenants: empty spaces are filling up."



### Hot Meeting on the Coldest Day of the Year

Association's board of directors and committee chairs held a retreat at the new Enfield Community Building to look at the progress we've made and where we'd like to go in the future. Kathy La Plante, director of the New Hampshire Main Street Center, which oversees the state's Main Street Programs, was present to provide guidance and perspective based on the experience of the hundreds of towns around the country operating successful Main Street programs. Gene Talsky, EVA's program director, who works out of EVA's donated office in the Copeland Block downtown, also was among the fifteen participants.

Board member and retired business consultant Don Gamache led a lively and enthusiastic discussion. The organization's size and scope were reconsidered, and past accomplishments and challenges reviewed. After the review, participants took a written vote on the major questions under consideration, leading to a consensus that EVA should stay about the same size and continue to concentrate on the same downtown

La Plante pointed out that the organization has entered the "business growth" phase, where new ventures come to town. This has already begun, as the Copeland Block is fully rented, and a commercial bakeryrelocated from another Upper Valley town—is now operating from the building and a restaurant is slated to open there once delayed equipment has been delivered.

After reaching decisions on the focus of EVA's Main Street Program, the retreat participants determined the specific events and programs that EVA will conduct. In addition to events such as the Farmers Market, Hometown Holidays, and the Shaker Seven Road Race and Fun Run, EVA will continue to participate in town events, including the Memorial Day parade, and to offer business forums, a business directory, market research, new business outreach, façade grants, banners and flags, holiday decorations, and flower planting. A number of these projects involve partnership with other local organizations.

On October 19, student artists from the Indian River School (IRS), along with families, friends, and EVA supporters, met at Whitney Hall to celebrate the project "A River Runs Through It." featuring artwork by more than sixty students. The project was spearheaded by EVA volunteer Bart Thurber of Dartmouth College's Hood Museum of Art. Based on studies of plants found at the riverside property at 78 Main Street, the students produced an amazing array of paintings, which were displayed at the site for the month of October. As well as attesting to the artistic talent of the students involved, this outdoor art gallery

served as an inventory of some of the natural treasures to be found right in our downtown area. Featured speaker Lionel Chute of the NH Natural Heritage Bureau introduced the audience to some of the flora found along EVA's river walk.
